Applicants are requested to send the following information along with their application:

1. A letter with information about yourself, your academic achievements (please include a copy of your university transcript for courses completed up to July 15, 2010) as well as outlining any volunteer experience or extra-curricular activities and any other information pertinent to your goals and qualifications.
2. A copy of the letter of acceptance into the first professional year of Optometry School from either the University of Waterloo or l'Université de Montréal or see Appendix B for accredited US schools.
3. Proof of residency in Nova Scotia (See Appendix A) and Canadian citizenship (a copy of your birth certificate or current Canadian passport or Certificate of Canadian Citizenship).
4. Current photo of yourself (copy of driver's license or passport)

I declare that I have read and understand all of the eligibility requirements for the NSAO scholarship and that the information that I have given is true and complete. I also agree that the NSAO may need my photo for publicity reasons and I grant them use of this photo (or a substitution photo) to announce the awarding of the bursary.

1. are a student and your parent(s) or guardian(s) have most recently resided, or maintained the principal family home, in Nova Scotia for a period of at least 60 consecutive months prior to the deadline of the scholarship application; or
 2. are a student, your parents are separated or divorced, and the parent with whom you live, or provides the principal financial support, has been a resident of Nova Scotia for at least 60 months prior to the deadline of the scholarship application; or,
 3. are a student and you have lived in Nova Scotia for 60 consecutive months prior to the deadline of the scholarship application, excluding time spent as a full-time student at a post-secondary institution.
